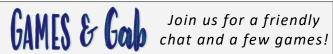

# Scams - Don't Be a Victim

Seniors lost almost \$1 billion in scams in 2020 according to an FBI report. Don't let that make you feel naïve or like an easy target; the reality is, the number of scams has increased for all ages. Consumers in the U.S. reportedly lost more than \$3.3 billion to fraud in 2020, up from \$1.8 billion in 2019. There has been a significant spike in job scams and online shopping scams.

Seniors are often targeted because they tend to be trusting and polite, and are more likely to have savings, own a home, and have good credit.

What are the most common scams targeting seniors? According to the National Council on Aging (NCOA) these scams include Medicare, counterfeit prescription drugs, funerals, investments, mortgages, sweepstakes/lotteries, and grandparent scams.

"Confidence fraud" did the most damage among seniors. These include scammers who impersonate loved ones and seek money for family emergencies.

Fraudsters use different tactics to get people to fall victim to their schemes. They can be friendly, sympathetic, and willing to help or use fear tactics.

Scam artists have gotten more creative, so what can you do to protect yourself?

Ask a lot of questions and be suspicious of individuals who offer excuses or ask you to ignore advice from loved ones. Don't be suckered in by fancy websites, research special offers (especially unsolicited ones), and remember the old saying: If it sounds too good to be true, it probably is!

Scammers often pose as IRS or Social Security agents, claiming immediate payment is needed to settle a matter. Real government officials will never seek a specific payment method (wire transfer, credit card, etc.), and they are not likely to contact you by phone, unless you initiated correspondence.

Aside from financial repercussions, being a victim of a scam can be detrimental to one's mental health, causing feelings of helplessness, embarrassment, or fear. This can effect physical health.

Protect yourself from fraudsters and avoid becoming a victim. Join us for a presentation from <u>C.A.R.I.E.</u> (Center for Advocacy for the Rights & Interests of the Elderly). If you suspect Medicare fraud or have a question about Medicare fraud or abuse, call C.A.R.I.E. at 800-356-3606.
